Message from Attorney Parker

Our nation has been moving closer to realizing the promise of its founding creed, that all men are created equal. And while this progression has been a slow process, it cannot be stopped.

Since Donald Trump first emerged on the political scene, a sizeable portion of our population has shown itself to harbor deep racial hatred and as many are consumed by racial and ethnic fear. They view America's changing demographic to one more richly hued as a threat to the favored status they have long enjoyed; they fear not only deprivation of the preferences to which they had grown accustomed but subjugation to demeaned status and treatment on a par with what blacks had endured for centuries and whose effects are still being felt to this day.
